After 15 years, he leaves CDH strong, vibrant, and ready for the future.

Frank Miley has stepped down as President of Cretin-Derham Hall after serving as President since 2015, and Vice President for Advancement under former President Dick Engler for eight years before that. His career in Catholic education may be coming to an end, but he is moving to a new role as a Co-CEO and Trustee of the Otto Bremer Trust, where he will continue to serve the greater community by leading one of the most impactful philanthropic organizations in the Midwest.

As President, Miley's impact will be felt for generations to come. He leaves CDH strong, vibrant, and ready for the future.

Miley worked very closely with Principal Mona Passman who expressed her gratitude for her friend and close colleague, who navigated the nuances and challenges of running a large school with one simple goal. "Frank is driven by the conviction that decisions should be made with the students' best interests at heart."

#### Sense of Mission

Passman also valued his deep sense of mission and his dedication to the legacy and leadership of the Christian Brothers and the Sisters of St. Joseph of Carondelet. Under his leadership, the charisms of these two sponsoring organizations were embedded into the students' experience, from daily prayer to opportunities to learn about the rich history and values that established the school.

It was also during his time as President that Blessed Brother James Miller, a former student and teacher at Cretin, was beatified on his path to sainthood. Miley led a delegation from CDH to Huehuetenango, Guatemala for the holy celebration. He was inspired by the simple works and ultimate sacrifice by this Christian Brother, often called Brother Fix-it during his Cretin days, who was martyred while fixing a wall at a school in Guatemala. Miley loved to tell the story of this holy man who walked the same halls as our students and teachers walk today, made every effort to help the students know and respect this man and his sacrifice, and renamed the CDH chapel and a courtyard on campus for him.

#### **Strategic Excellence, Even During Challenging Times**

"Frank set a high bar to ensure we provide an excellent education for each and every student," said Passman. "One of the first things he did as president was to expand our learning lab to embrace students with learning differences by increasing staffing and moving the space to a larger and more central location in the building."

Miley reinforced the school's commitment to every student's experience, paying special attention to diversity and inclusion by providing new student programming and support, implementing intentional hiring practices, and delivering professional development for the entire staff. CDH now has the most diverse staff and Board membership in history and a new Director of Dignity and Inclusion to support and advocate for continued school-wide progress in this critical area.

During COVID-19, schools, in particular, navigated uncharted territory with shutdowns, strong mitigation measures, distance learning, and uncertainty while balancing the academic and social needs of students. School leaders often found themselves at odds with parents and staff and students whose personal perspectives and values varied tremendously. CDH was no different, but when it was possible, Miley led the effort to be among the first schools in Minnesota to bring students back on campus for in-person learning.

Through it all, Miley valued the role that 'community' played in our school's success. To provide valuable strategic direction to CDH, Miley led a broad community effort to build the 2020-2025 Strategic Plan. He included more than 100 community members in the development of the plan that invited input from all constituents through surveys, listening sessions, and focus groups. This plan has directed the school's efforts in each of the seven values, making remarkable progress in key initiatives outlined in the plan.

#### Financial Stability Today, and in the Future

Throughout his tenure, Miley often remarked that he believed that the CDH Values should also include an eighth one: generosity. He would point to the distinctive level of support from alumni, parents, faculty/staff who generously gave because of their unparalleled belief in our school and their desire to invest in excellence and our school's mission.

His enviable success in advancement meant that tuition was lowered significantly for every student, covering about 20% of the costs to educate. In addition, CDH is able to offer significant



Another program Miley started was a robust merit scholarship program that provided valuable scholarships to deserving students for academic, faith, character, and leadership potential. Former President, Dick Engler noted that Frank was aware of the financial needs of many young men and women of this school and he was dedicated to building the endowment, "so that every young man and young woman who wished to come to Cretin-Derham Hall would have that opportunity. What a gift that is..."

Miley leaves the school on a very sound financial footing by meeting those immediate financial needs of our students, keeping compensation of faculty and staff competitive, and maintaining excellence in programming, as well as strengthening the school's long-term financial health.

In addition, the Tom and Debbie Lentsch Forum was built to provide a space for students to gather, relax, or work. Often called the living room of the school, this space is highly used at all hours of the day and beautifully met the needs originally identified by students who recognized the necessity for this type of space several years earlier.

The new Ryan STEM Center was also built, adding space for both a design lab and construction space. With the CDH commitment to academic excellence as a driver, this dedicated space offers tools, equipment, space, and mentoring for problemsolving, collaboration, and creativity as part of both curriculum and co-curricular activities such as the Robotics Team.

Even as he finished his term, Miley was instrumental in launching a planning study and campaign plan for athletic facility improvements which will impact nearly every student's experience and actively worked to establish a foundation for success of this campaign before he was done.

#### Family

Miley is also the proud father of seven children, six of whom graduated from Cretin-Derham Hall. His belief in the transformational impact of this school on students came from a personal perspective of a parent who saw his children leave CDH ready to tackle the next phase of their lives, well-prepared in mind, body, and spirit.

Catholic education has always and will continue to be part of the fabric of their family's life. Born, raised, and educated in Catholic schools in the Archdiocese, Miley's early career included both teaching and administrative positions in other local Catholic high schools. In addition, his wife and three of his children have been or are currently teachers in Catholic schools.

While leaving CDH means formally retiring from Catholic education, he shares that his heart will always be with the unparalleled efforts of the dedicated and talented teachers, staff, families, and benefactors who work miracles with today's students and are changing lives and communities every day.

#### Next Leader for CDH

Miley passes the reins to Teri McCloughan, who was appointed as Interim President by the Sisters of St. Joseph and the Christian Brothers with full support of the Board of Directors. She will serve the school as Interim President during the search for a permanent president.

As the school readies itself for the next phase of a long history of excellence, Maria Wagner Reamer '82, Chair of the Board of Directors, believes the school has been well-prepared for this transition due to the impact of Frank's leadership on our school and community, "Frank honored the rich traditions and excellence of our past while setting CDH on a course to ensure our strength today and success in the future, while always loving God and our dear neighbor without distinction."



# **CDH Names** Teri McCloughan as Interim President

The Cretin-Derham Hall Board of Directors selected Teri McCloughan as Interim President of Cretin-Derham Hall.

McCloughan, an attorney and former CDH Board of Directors Chair, will lead the school over the next year as a national search is underway for a permanent president. She assumed the duties of the president upon the recent departure of Frank Miley who left the school to be a Co-CEO and Trustee of the Otto Bremer Trust. The Sisters of St. Joseph of Carondelet and the Christian Brothers approved the selection of McCloughan with high confidence that she will effectively lead the school forward during this transition.

"In addition to Teri's unparalleled executive skills and broad understanding of our school's operations, she brings a deep love of this school and our community," said Mike Dickson, Past Board Chair. "We are thrilled to have her leadership during this transition."

Over the past two decades, McCloughan has served the CDH community in many leadership roles, most notably, as Past Chair of the Board of Directors (2008-10) and Current Chair of the Advancement Committee. She was also the 2012 recipient of the Eugene and Mary Frey Community Award, for those individuals who reflect the mission and values of CDH.

She and her husband Kevin are proud parents of four CDH graduates, and together they chaired the Strong Foundation, Vibrant Future Campaign which was successfully concluded in 2022. Both have been active in the CAA (Catholic Athletic Association).

Her service to the broader community also includes serving as Board Chair for Risen Christ Catholic School, MINNDEPENDENT, and ProAct, Inc. She was a volunteer for the Ramsey County Guardian Ad Litem Program for 10 years and named 2019 Volunteer of the Year for her advocacy for the best interests of children in the court system.

"I am honored to have the opportunity to serve as the Interim President of Cretin-Derham Hall while the Board of Directors conducts its search for the next President. I look forward to working with the leadership team, faculty and Board during this time of transition and to maintaining the commitment to excellence for our students and their families," said McCloughan.

She continued, "With the charisms of our Sponsors as our guide, the commitment of our faculty and staff, and the strong financial foundation built through the tremendous generosity of our alumni and benefactors, the future of Cretin-Derham Hall is bright!

Under the CDH President/Principal model, McCloughan will work closely with Principal Mona Passman. She will also have support from Miley during the transition.

"Teri's careful and thoughtful leadership will enable our dedicated CDH faculty and staff to continue to provide an excellent education for our students and to ensure that our school is a place for each one to be challenged and supported in their academic, personal, and spiritual growth," noted Maria Reamer, current Board Chair.

The search for the permanent President continues, with the search firm Carney Sandoe & Associates leading the process, along with the Board of Directors. Current plans are underway for a school visit in early fall as well as opportunities for the community to provide input. # A Heart for Service

## Bridgette Cook Startz '77 supports her community.

From a cancer research center to historical reenactments, Bridgette Cook Startz '77 has always found ways to serve her community, and this commitment started in high school.

Reynolds J. Fischbach, DDS, PA, '48 had a policy of only hiring Cretin and Derham Hall students to work at his Highland Park dental office. He wanted to support their education and teach them about potential dental and hygiene careers. One of those students was Bridgette Cook Startz '77.

She was interested in a medical environment so she started out as a janitor, but the role quickly evolved into so much more than a high school job. Startz worked there for ten years spanning her high school and college years at St. Mary's Junior College (Minneapolis) as well as working part-time even while she had her first full-time job at the VA Medical Center in Minneapolis.

Fischbach passed away this spring, and his funeral was in the midst of a busy week for Startz. But there was no question whether she'd attend; she drove eight hours round trip from her home in Fargo to be there.

Those are the kinds of relationships so many Cretin, Derham Hall, and Cretin-Derham Hall grads talk about, and it's why Startz has prioritized giving back to the school.

"I had a great four years," she said. "I met a lot of lifelong friends. I learned a lot of life lessons from the teachers, and I received an excellent, faith-based education. You need to give back to a place that has given you so much." Startz, and her husband Robert, have gifted CDH with two life insurance policies with their goal to support CDH long into the future.

In many ways, Startz has built her life around giving back. She never became a nurse and instead studied medical records. After a few years at the Minneapolis VA, she got an incredible opportunity at the University of Southern California, Norris Cancer Research Institute in Los Angeles, California. The Norris, as it was known, was opening its door as one of the 21 original Comprehensive Cancer Research Centers in the nation. They needed someone to manage the cancer registry, and Startz

"I collected mandated cancer data on cancer patients, and I did it all manually," Startz said. "We didn't have computers — we used little recipe cards and filed them in little boxes by anatomic cancer sites. While I was there, this facility was going to be computerized and I was able to develop and advise the programmers to write the program to include required American College of Surgeons data elements. Being in on the ground floor of an operation like that — it was incredible."

Startz spent nine years in California before returning to the Twin Cities to complete her Bachelor's degree in Health Data

Management at St. Scholastica. She continued working in cancer research while living with her parents. Her mother, heartbreakingly, was diagnosed with stage IV small cell lung cancer in 1992 and died a month later at the age of 57.

"Cancer was my world," Startz said. "I knew when I heard the diagnosis, that the prognosis was ominous. But I wasn't going to tell her that. I encouraged her to fight, of course, but it was too late."

Just three months earlier, Startz had married Robert F. Startz, MD, a pathologist she met during a research project at the Norris Cancer Center. The loss of her mother had shaken her faith, but he helped her find her way back.

"I was very angry with God," she remembers. "She never was blessed with time to develop a relationship with my husband, nor did she ever meet my sons. Sunday would come around and I didn't want to go to church, but my husband encouraged me. Having faith in something higher is so important and he helped me return to that.'

After their wedding, the couple moved to Robert's hometown, Oxbow, ND.

A few years later, she had twin boys, now 27, and decided to stay home to raise them. When her boys reached middle school, she began volunteering with the lunch program. Volunteering turned into a job, and she has stayed long past their graduation. "I just love those kids. You get to know them and help them. It's just a great gig."

Over the years, Startz has found seemingly endless ways to serve her local community. She was deeply committed to supporting her sons' school activities and sports teams. She also returned to her healthcare roots, volunteering for 12 years as an EMT/FirstResponder in rural Oxbow/Hickson, ND.

More recently, she spent seven years as part of the Hospital Befriender program at Essentia Hospital in Fargo, providing communion to Catholic patients, including priests and nuns. "I saw maybe 20 patients on a visit. You'd take the time to get to know them, pray with them, distribute Eucharist and simply see if they needed anything else. For me, it was very rewarding and very emotionally gratifying."

These days, she volunteers at Bonanzaville, a recreated rural North Dakota town in the early twentieth century, dressing in period clothing and serving as a docent in the historic hotel/saloon and printing press.

"Giving back, I guess I'll credit my mother for that one. She was a life-long member of the Altar and Rosary Society, and was always volunteering at the church or at our schools. She taught me that you can't put that stuff off. It's like investing in the market. The best time to start is today."

# René Rodriguez '93 Follows His Gut

# A success borne of hard work and passion.

René Rodriguez '93 was never a standout on the basketball court. He fell in love with the sport at seven years old and played through high school but he spent more time on the bench than on the court. Still, he never gave up.

"I learned how to struggle through something for 13 years until I was good," he said. "Every time the season would end I'd run harder, practice more over the summer. There was never a day I didn't dribble a basketball or shoot. I was one of those guys that just kept showing up. It was almost a good thing that I wasn't good early on because it kept me working hard."

Hard work came much more naturally to him on the court but he struggled in the classroom. He had a hard time focusing on material that didn't feel relevant to his life. However, he could hyper-focus on the things he was excited about. His fondest memories were the business camps he had the opportunity to attend with Brother Martel. Martel was tough, but he made sure his students were engaged. He used creative methods to capture attention by making them use colors and take pride in their notebooks. "I still have my note books from his classes!" raved Rodriguez. His Psychology teacher once invited a magician to class, who demonstrated magic tricks and tied them to the concept of perception.

From that one demonstration, Rodriguez was hooked. He went on to study Behavioral Neuroscience at the University of St. Thomas. The subject matter fascinated him, and he had no trouble focusing and working hard. Those years on the court paid off, even if he did get cut from the St. Thomas team his sophomore year — paving the way for his first professional success.

Rodriguez got a job selling cookware door-to-door, and put what he was learning in the classroom into

practice. He used storytelling, and emotion, and built a narrative where the cookware he was offering could truly change his customers' lives.

"Of course, it only worked because I believed in it," he said. "I had to buy my own first set, so I could have integrity when I was selling it. On top of that, the ability to show emotion and to tell a story, connect through body language, all of that stuff came from psychology."

Rodriguez was one of the top five salespeople nationwide by the end of college, and was receiving high-paying job offers from major corporations often waiving their own GPA requirements. However, he turned down all of those offers for one paying 1/3 as much that would give him the chance to have conversations on a daily basis that would continue his learning and growth.

His mother ran a successful change management consulting company, and by working with her Rodriguez knew he would have the chance to solve complicated problems, and to use neuroscience to understand behavior and add value to the business.

"I learned training at its highest level, training groups that were resistant," he said. "I learned how to engage and enroll an audience that hates you really quickly. Then, bringing my knowledge of sales, combined with the brain research and neuroscience, merging that with the science of behavior change — it was a very powerful and unique skill set."

He's been doing this work for over 25 years now, although his focus has shifted to leadership training courses and keynote speaking — he spoke 237 days in 2022. His work is his passion, and you can see it when he talks about the people


"Part of our purpose in life is to utilize the gifts that God has given us," he said. "There's a question I try to ask at the end of each day: 'Did I do good

today?" If the answer is no, the next day I do something to be better, be a better person, love my neighbor even more. But if I didn't ask that question, if I didn't reflect on my life, there would be no improvement."

Following his passions has led to a life and career Rodriguez couldn't have dreamed of as a "mediocre" student, and he hopes today's high schoolers learn to appreciate the gifts of hard work, discipline, and perseverance. Rodriguez believes that the ability to endure during difficult times is one of the major keys to life long success.

"Take as much time as you can to engage in the things you love," he said. "if you have a passion for chess, go play chess and play the heck out of it. If you like band, be the best band member that you can be. Go do as much as you can of the things you love, engage as heavily and as deeply as you can in those things. Follow your gut. And don't be so concerned with what other people are thinking."

Rodriguez's book, Amplify Your Influence: Transform How You Communicate and Lead provides advice grounded in neuroscience to help leaders make an impact.

# **Working for Justice**

# Judge Paulette Kane Flynn '67 believes in accountability

As Judge Paulette Kane Flynn '67 retired from the bench in 2014, she was given a hammer in a beautiful frame. Not a gavel, as one might expect.

"Apparently I was known as "the hammer" by the inmates in the jail," chuckled Judge Flynn who was known for her strict enforcement of the law when dealing with probation violations. In her Ramsey County courtroom, she always tried to be a neutral umpire and base her decisions on the facts and the evidence. She believed that both parties needed to feel that they were heard and that they had a fair shake. And, at the end of the day, a judge needs to be decisive and willing to make an unpopular decision.

After being a judge for 23 years, two things stand out to her today. First, she appreciates how fortunate she is to have been born into her family, where she was provided the benefit of a good education that opened doors to many opportunities. Secondly, Judge Flynn has come to respect the power of the moment. "I am frequently reminded of how a person's entire life can be changed in the blink of an eye by a bad decision or being in the wrong place at the wrong time. That is why I always tell my grandchildren to 'make good choices."

#### Legal Career and Leadership

When she attended William Mitchell College of Law in the early 1970s, there were approximately ten women in her law school class of 125. Undaunted by this imbalance, and despite being accused by some of taking a seat that should have gone to a man who would be supporting a family, she believed the women were treated fairly in law school and often found being a woman in the legal profession was an advantage.

At the time, a woman attorney was certainly novel, especially at the beginning of her career. She recalled, "Once, the judge presiding over one of my trials called the media because this was the first time he had seen both a woman prosecutor and a woman defense attorney on the same case."

Her inspiration and commitment to the legal profession came from her aunt Margaret Kane, born in 1901 and one of only a handful of women attorneys in St. Paul who practiced law during the Depression era and after.

After law school, Flynn went to work for the St. Paul City Attorney's Office. As an assistant city attorney, she began her career as a prosecutor in the criminal division, only the third woman to be hired in this office. In this role she spent nearly 80% of her time in court and tried numerous jury and court trials. She was later appointed chief prosecutor, supervising all the attorneys in the criminal division, and was also head of the screening unit for serious offenders. She additionally served as an instructor in the police academy.

After many years of being a prosecutor, she was appointed

the head of the city's civil litigation division, handling a wide variety of cases ranging from accidents to police brutality and worker's compensation claims. In this position she represented the St. Paul Department of Human Rights regarding discrimination and civil rights cases.

In 1984, she joined the law firm of Stringer, Courtney & Rohleder practicing in the areas of insurance defense, family and employment law until 1986 when she joined the firm of Felhaber, Larson, Fenlon & Vogt and focused on labor/employment litigation. She became a partner in this firm in 1988. She was also elected as the first woman president of the Ramsey County Bar Association in 1989.

As her career progressed, her value to Minnesota's legal system also grew. Governor Arne Carlson appointed her a Ramsey County District Judge on September 11, 1991. She retired in 2014, but has served as a Senior Judge ever since, providing backup on the bench as needed.

"I did not set out to be a judge, but I think it was a natural progression of my career," said Judge Flynn. "My work as a prosecutor and my civil litigation practice frequently put me in the courtroom where I gained the necessary experience to do trial work. I merely switched roles from an advocate to a judge."

However, the mother of two explained that she had another important life experience that certainly helped her prepare for being a judge, "My experience as a mother prepared me for requiring accountability and consequences when it came to those on probation."

#### Derham Hall (and CDH) Matter


As a Derham Hall graduate, she believes her education in high school definitely positively impacted her career as a lawyer and a judge. "At Derham, we learned how to think critically and how to express ourselves."


She also believed the all-girl education in the 1960s gave the students the confidence to assume roles that were traditionally dominated by males.

Judge Flynn is married to Dr. Edward Hanton. Her connection to the CDH family continues...she has two grown children, both of whom graduated from Cretin-Derham Hall, Patrick Flynn '95 and Katie Flynn '96. She has six grandchildren: Sofia Flynn '20, and two current CDH students, 11th grader Merritt Flynn and 9th grader Lola Noyes. She has three more grandchildren in grade school: Conor Flynn (8th grade), Patrick Flynn (7th grade) and Michael Noves (5th grade).

Beyond the educational advantages of Derham Hall, Judge Flynn values the friendships she made. "I am so happy my grandchildren are part of CDH," said Judge Flynn. "I think CDH has something for everyone, and I am most impressed by its strong community. CDH connections last a lifetime."





# Building the Raider Classes of 2027 and 2028

The Class of 2027 is projected to be one of the largest incoming classes of 9th graders in years. "We have some exciting energy happening in Admissions," said Sean Van Gemert '96, Admissions Director.

Indications this past school year were all pointing to a strong class of incoming 9th graders, with Family Raider Experiences at an all time high, applications and registrations both higher than the past several years, and interest by potential students and their families continuing through this summer.

The incoming Class of 2027 is anticipated to be made up of students from over 80 middle schools. "CDH has long enjoyed a strong number of students from Catholic grade schools, and this continues," explained Van Gemert. "But when you see students coming from all over, there is a sense that students can start strong here even without a core group of students they already know. Students are ready to build their own new community."

One of the keys to a positive experience for prospective families is the connection formed with Student Ambassadors and Parent Ambassadors. Van Gemert gives all prospective students and parents a tour of the school during the school day with lots of information, followed by lunch and a Q & A opportunity.

On those Family Raider Experiences, current students, faculty, and even parents often join in. "So many questions go to the current students because they are in the middle of it all and can talk about their personal experience in a relatable way," said Van Gemert. Prospective students also shadow these students after lunch to get a feel of the student experience.

The tours also allow the Admissions Department to get to know the prospective students and their interests. "If we find out one of the 8th graders is interested in soccer or the theater," Van Gemert explained, "We invite them to a soccer game or a production and give them the chance to interact with students and leaders in those areas to begin the development of the relationships that will help them achieve success at CDH."

Making the investment in Catholic education is a strong consideration for all families. CDH awards more than \$3 million in tuition assistance to families with need. Another distinctive program at CDH is a large merit scholarship program that provides financial awards to students who apply for a variety of scholarships related to academic excellence, faith – service – leadership, and interest in the JROTC program.

"We work very hard to keep a CDH education accessible," noted Van Gemert.

Summer is often a time the Admissions Office becomes busy with incoming 9th graders and students who may transfer in. Last year, more than 40 students entering grades 10-12 transferred in. CDH hosts all incoming new students, 9th graders and transfers, to a welcoming and informative orientation in August.














## **STEAM WEEK 2023** Making the World Better

He is married to his wife April and they have two daughters, Abby and Jaelyn, and their beloved goldendoodle, Ollie. As a family, they love heading to the cabin in Cambridge and having fun on the lake!

#### Tell us about your decision to switch from working in administration as Dean of Students to teaching.

I have always loved teaching high school students. I have had a passion for doing this since day one. In my early years, I found the Dean of Students role a great opportunity to work with all kinds of students and make a difference in their dayto-day high school experience. It was a great job, but when the PE teaching job came available, I jumped at the opportunity to

In my life, I don't know if education found me or I found education. I grew into it, like we all do, but I know that teaching high schoolers — this age — is my passion. I am lucky to have the chance to interact with so many different groups. I don't take it for granted.

Whether it is as simple as students saying 'hello' in the hall or talking with me about making their college decision, this is such an important time in their lives, and so it is important to me, too.

#### What is one of your favorite memories from your high school years?

I will always remember my senior year in 1993, winning the basketball state title, and celebrating our accomplishments with my teammates and Coaches Len Horyza and Arvesta Kelly.

My basketball team gave me the chance to work with my teammates to accomplish an ultimate goal. A championship is great, but it's the journey that makes it special. We learned if you put in the hard work, success follows.

### Do you have a teacher or a coach (from anytime in your life through today ) that has inspired you? What 'lesson' did they

My father, Jerry Sr., coached me throughout my childhood and taught me so many lessons throughout life. Not only did he teach me the fundamentals of sports but how to treat people the right way. He taught me how to win with grace and lose

He really supported CDH and the basketball program like nothing else. Maybe you could call him the 'original super fan.' He connected with our student athletes and had a big impact on the kids on our teams — fun fact, many of the kids called him 'Grampy.'

It was a difficult December because I lost my father to Alzheimer's Disease. He will be greatly missed by many people, especially the CDH Basketball family. RIP Dad.

#### You have been close to students at some of the most important times of their lives — either challenging or joyful what impresses you about high school students today?

What impresses me is how today's students have the perseverance to manage so much life including family, academics, friends, social media, etc.

I always talk to my students about this important idea about 'balance.' Balance means how do you manage the normal ups and downs so that you don't have these deep and scary dives. We all have to manage it all, and keep a good perspective about life.

Students ask me all the time, "How come you are so loud and so happy all the time?"

"It's simple," I tell them. "I want you to have a good experience for the hour you are with me!" I believe that energy is contagious.

#### What advice would you give our students as they leave high school?

Find your passion and enjoy what you do!

You only get one shot at life. When you find something that you care about...do it. Happiness will follow. When you think about what matters, 'joy' is way more important than money will ever be!

#### Beyond the curriculum/sports skill work, what do you hope your students learn from you?

To be kind, respect others, and be confident in yourself. One of the most rewarding things is when students come back and say thank you because they realize how much they grew because we listened to them and they learned from those life lessons we can sometimes take for granted.

#### Is basketball your passion...Why?

Yes!! Coaching is all about taking a young group of boys in November and seeing their big improvement by March — it is the best journey every season.

We develop a sense of unselfishness and togetherness as a team. It is not just about wins and losses...it's the connections and the experience of being a 'team.' How you win and how you lose — this really matters. We can regroup either way. It's all about being competitive and seeing these individual athletes compete by giving their best to the team effort.

Being a coach means working with great assistant coaches to build camaraderie and a family environment, so we can get kids to buy into this culture that will be important in their life, not just on the court.



There are so many opportunities during the season to present life skills, life situations, and discover the 'aha' moments. And it's not just coaches who are in charge of this. We build mutual respect. When my players say, "I got you coach" whether we are working on a play, after a loss or better yet, a win, it is such a victory.

#### Do you have any sayings, mantras, unique expectations for your students or teams that you are known for?

My basketball players hear this a lot: "FINISH, REBOUND PURPLE..."

It reflects our philosophy — simple words that express determination and dedication. We keep it relatable to the players.

As a coach, we always have a play called 'the Raider.' This reminds us all what it means to play for our school and gets to the core of who we are.

#### In addition to teaching this year, you are also leading SUPER FANS...tell us more about this group and why you believe in growing the impact of this group.

It's a great way for our students to have a positive experience supporting other students in athletics, arts, and academics. Students love to see their peers cheering them on, whether at sports or a band concert, which makes for a wonderful experience.

This year we had 18 seniors as Superfans. Their energy for classmates was awesome. They were accountable and made it fun. They worked hard to build community. Next year, we plan to keep growing and including more support on the activities side.

I believe in helping our students make good choices on campus...not bad choices somewhere else. We all know the students have to go to class, but after school, they get to choose what they do. The Superfans made the 'game day experience' even better for students of all ages.

## **Give CDH Day: Beyond the Books** Donors' Generosity Enhances Co-curriculars

The 3rd Annual GiveCDH Day: Beyond the Books raised nearly \$90,000 from 271 donors to provide an opportunity for teams and organizations to enhance their programs at CDH. This support is a hallmark of our community, pulling together to enrich our students' experience in co-curricular activities!

At a school where 95% of our students are involved in a co-curricular, GiveDay: Beyond the Books has an impact on almost every student in our community. Co-curriculars are an important part of our commitment to grow our young peoples' minds, bodies, and faith. A 2016 Gallup-Purdue Index study of college graduates shows former student-athletes — particularly women — fared significantly better after graduation than non-athletes in several measures of well-being, including sense of purpose, social relationships, relationship to their communities, and physical health.

Our community's support is vital to continue to give our students the experience they need to continue to grow. In your generosity, you are a part of our belief, "Culture Creates Champions."

Several of our co-curricular coaches already have plans for enriching their programs which will impact their students' experience. For instance, Lisa Thomas, Girls Swim & Dive Coach, was very intentional when asked how the swim program could use donated funds through GiveCDH Day: Beyond the Books. "We identified our need for a swim and dive record board and started generating and researching records. We started pricing them last year to prepare for our Give Day this year. We raised enough to purchase the board and are looking forward to seeing those records up in the fitness center where our kids work with Training Haus!"

JROTC is planning to use their donated funds to help offset the cost of sending cadets to Rifle, Drill, Archery, Orienteering, and Robotics competitions next year. COL Joseph E. Scrocca, Senior Army Instructor, is very excited about the impact of these funds on their program.

"We really want to take our program to the next level and competition with other JROTC programs at the regional, state and national level is one way to get there."

According to Head Coach Matt Funk, the Boys' Hockey Team will be using the money received from this recent GiveDay to help offset some general costs for the program and to help keep costs for families low in a sport where costs are rising.

Every little bit helps! Megan Fee Smith '00, Girls Golf Coach, is planning on using the funds raised on GiveDay: Beyond the Books for new umbrellas for the team which will be very helpful during the unpredictable weather every Spring season.


# Drs. Tim '64 and Kim Scanlan Give Back to the Science Department




Board of Trustees in 2002 and was recognized with the Distinguished Alumnus Award in 2009."

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
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


